	January Action Item list.
	A copy of the Quarterly Report to the Navajo Nation President, Ben Shelley was provided to the attending steering committee members. This report includes the NDOT transportation projects and accomplishments, airport reports and supporting documents.
	Everyone is focused on the SR 89 closure and collaborating with ADOT on the N20 project. The clearance reports should be completed by April 22. Working closely on the N20 with Taft Blackhorse and Mike Kolana, they are meeting daily with NDOT departments with BIA to discuss the N20 issues, detour standards, temporary easements, and environmental assessments and livestock
	provisions.
	Summary: no time for the ROW plans or legal description discussions, will move forward with the exiting provisions.
	The 4 partnership members involved in the N20 are ADOT, NDOT, BIA, and FHWA. There has been extensive communication with the local communities about the US 89 closure and the use of N20 as a detour route and plans to pave N20 and staying with the current alignment.
	Consent needed from the locals that live along N20, that have grazing permits that might affect cattle fences or cattle guards. April 30 is the deadline for comments and then the project will move ahead. TCE easement and ROW – 300 foot area, but 200 foot is for the road Storage areas for water and materials to be identified.
	Locals are supportive of the road paving and will adjust to the changes
	Follow up meeting scheduled for April 18 and proposed construction could begin in early May.
	N20 will reduce the detour by 45 miles for residents, and busing school children to Page for school.
	Jason Yazzie – Has been meeting with the Chapters to prioritize the road maintenance plans. Continue to coordinate with the Chapters and educate the

public on the costs of grating and maintaining the dirt roads. It is very expensive to transport the water and the gravel materials needed on projects.

Each Chapter will receive an average of 15 miles of dirt road maintenance. 110 chapters are dividing the money. NDOT is requesting that the chapters match or put in some money to assist with the maintenance.

Most of the routes are straight and that makes it easier to grate and repair Each chapter will submit a resolution for 3 routes that are their 2013 priority.

Heavy equipment operators will be trained to properly operate the equipment

Navajo County, Jonathan Nez has been supportive to push the initiatives forward. Donating \$10,000 from the Red Dog Gravel projects to 10 areas of NDOT roads for spot graveling. NDOT will schedule the grading effort and identify the roads, based on use and bus routes.

Planning stages of hosting a stakeholder meeting at the end of summer to address fuel excise tax distribution.

Chapter House Communication Efforts:

Initial issues:

- Communication to all the chapters directly or indirectly affected by closure
- Navajo translator is needed to read the brochures and handouts to those that don't understand English
- Need to focus on the small communities and the Hogan level
- Kayenta and other small towns are affected and should be included in all communications
- Updates were not reaching some of the smaller communities on Navajo Nation.
- ADOT has extended outreach to the communities on the weekends to reach more of the local residents. Audra Merrick and Amy Rosen have been highly visible at the Chapter meetings.

Navajo Translation is needed at the small community level

- Customized outreach to tribal communities
- Translator identified to help and assist at the Hogan meetings
- Chapter liaison identified for communication not just the Chapter president
- FHWA could reimburse for liaison public information tasks for emergency event
- Keep notes of the public outreach meetings

\$10 Million direct funding agreement with BIA federal funding is in final process, being assigned to separate accounts, formalizing the reporting process

NDOT receives \$55 million a year, and has reached an agreement with BIA to self administer \$10 million in 2013.

In June, 25 NDOT employees will attend an extensive training to learn to administer the funding process.

This pilot project will streamline the project management. In the future, NDOT will request more funds to be self-administered.

Will be used for road maintenance in 2013. BIA will continue to do the road construction.

Identified the need for a safety department to be established, new database software to track activities, increase staff and heavy equipment operators, and fueling stations.

State Aviation Program: SB 1317

- Senate Bill 1317 to allow tribal airports to receive funding from the State Aviation fund.
- New opportunities to compete for federal aviation funds to repair runways and airports
- A total of \$20 M available in AZ for aviation projects, capital improvement
